ish Columbia, Hahn broke into the broadcasting business in Vancouver and then took a TV job in Edmonton, his hometown. It was there in 1982 that he got his big break.

"It was always my dream to work in the U.S. in media," he said, recalling his routine of watching Johnny Carson while working nights at the Edmonton station. "To break into hockey in Canada, it's almost like breaking into the NFL here. It's tough. The competition is fierce."

The job he landed wasn't in hockey. It was in soccer — indoor soccer, no less — calling games for the San Diego Sockers. It came with a significant pay cut too. "It probably took a millisecond to agree to that," said Hahn, so driven was he to work in the States.

He applied for and was granted a U.S. work permit in 1982, then four years later, received a green card after he married local meteorologist Roberta Gonzales. The job with the Sockers continued for 10 years. In that time, Hahn called World Cup soccer games, worked as a studio anchor in Chicago, and became a studio host for Los Angeles Kings games before he started his tenure with the Sharks.

What he hadn't done in all of those years was become an American citizen.

"I was able to stay in the U.S. and stay working as a permanent resident, so I just kind of pushed that to the side and said, 'You know, maybe someday I'll do it,'" Hahn said. "And then I just kept renewing my green card."

Hahn said the onset of the pandemic in 2020 — when there were no Sharks games to call — helped to finally kickstart the process. He downloaded the required forms and paid the \$1,000 application fee.

After waiting all those years to take action, Hahn discovered that Uncle Sam also operates on his own schedule. The pandemic had created a backlog of citizenship applications, so Hahn, after an FBI background check, had to wait two years before he could go in for his one-on-one interview and a civics exam.

In the exam, applicants must answer at least six out of 10 questions correctly. Hahn got his first five questions right but was stumped for a moment on the sixth: Who was the President dur-

ing World War I?

Woodrow Wilson, Hahn answered, for the win.

Hahn, who was remarried last October, received his swearing-in date, the date on which he would officially become an American. He thought the ceremony would be with a large group of people, but the United States Citizenship and Immigration Services office was still operating under stringent COVID protocols.

So when Hahn arrived in a suit for his 8 a.m. appointment in July, he was assigned a lane and directed to remain in his car. When his car reached the front of the line, he was allowed to get out for the swearing-in ceremony — performed by an officer who was a Sharks fan — with about 20 other people.

Hahn said he wasn't asked to recite the Pledge of Allegiance. The officer mostly said it aloud and everyone there just had to say yes. People then got back into their cars and waited before being asked to roll down their windows.

"They handed us our certificate of citizenship, congratulated us, and told us to drive away because there were more cars behind us," Hahn said.

"I was expecting a little more pomp and circumstance to be sworn in," he said. "But it was kind of weird after all those years to have a drive-thru citizenship or be across the street from Costco, which, incidentally, is where we went out to take pictures because they wouldn't let us take them in front of the building."

Remenda was happy for Hahn, who's now eligible to vote and serve on a jury. Still, he was curious about one thing: When the U.S. plays Canada in hockey, who will Hahn cheer for?

"I guess from that standpoint, if it's head-to-head," Hahn said, "I still have to cheer for Canada. I'm sorry."

we are," Manley-Diaz said. "This is not just for the girls. It is for the community, the parents, the grandparents that are here, the uncles and aunts, the students. It's really cool that they're celebrating."

The Cardinals were led by Hannah Fleming with 31 kills, Gigi Brown with 11 kills, setter Phoebe Liermann with 43 assists and five blocks and middle Jordan Simpkins with seven kills and seven blocks.

Harbor (20-5, 7-3) was paced by Isla Johnson with 11 kills and Holly Rejfir with 10. Libero Tara Bikanja led the defense with 26 digs.

"I think tonight we put it all together," Fleming said. "We are finally jelling. We did not play hesitantly."

In the first set, the defense of Biakanja fueled an offense directed by setters Maren O'Farrell and Sandy Enriquez for a 30-

28 victory, threatening to throw the SCCAL race into a 3-way tie. There were six set points until Johnson provided the deciders with a tip over the block and a deep line kill.

"Harbor runs a fast offense and their defense is incredible," Beck-Watts said. "Their libero (Bikanja) went off. She had a fabulous game."

Santa Cruz huddled and came out playing better. Antonia Wilson, returning from an ankle injury and estimated at perhaps 70% by Manley-Diaz, shared the setting with Liermann. Fleming continued to rip kills but the two setters also found Brown and Sadie Jeffrey on the outside and Simpkins and Julie Miritz in the middle. Santa Cruz jumped out to a 10-2 lead, saw it shrink to 14-13 and then scored three straight and rolled to a 25-18 victory to even matters at a set apiece.

"We started off kinda rough, especially on deep seams," Fleming said. "We adjusted well and we

learned throughout the game. Adjust and step over and not let a ball drop."

The Santa Cruz defense continued to dig Pirate attacks. In the third set, a four-point mid-set run, led by Fleming and Simpkins, opened things up. The fourth set was similarly close until another Santa Cruz run, an eight-point blast.

"Hannah was on fire tonight," Manley-Diaz said. "I had a conversation with her before the match. I said you don't need to kill everything. We need you to be consistent. Tonight, everything was going in the court. And give credit to Summer (Pederson). Her passing was setting up the kills. And Cass really stepped up tonight. It's fun to see Summer and Cass together."

Harbor will finish the regular season next week and likely face Soquel in the No. 2-No. 3 semifinal matchup in the SCCAL tournament. A CCS playoff berth awaits thereafter.

"We played hard," Harbor coach Matt Schutz said.

"They played hard. We battled, they battled. We were swinging and being aggressive. We just didn't make all the plays. But we are improving and trying to play our best volleyball at the end of the year."

"I definitely like beating them. I think I've only beat them once since I've been here," senior defensive lineman Cade Hall said. "I'm 1-2 against them. I want to fix that before I leave."

The teams have traveled very different paths so far this season.

It has been one bump and bruise after another for the Bulldogs. They are winless since their season opener against Cal Poly, and pre-season Heisman darkhorse quarterback Jake Haener suffered an ankle injury in a 45-17 loss at USC.

The product of Danville's Monte Vista High won't play Saturday and might not return this season. Logan Fife stepped in at quarterback and has yet to throw a touchdown pass while being intercepted four times.

Fresno State's road-heavy schedule hasn't helped either. The Bulldogs lost games at the Pac-12's Oregon State and USC — and opened conference play last weekend at MW favorite Boise State and lost 40-20. Along the way, the Bulldogs lost at Connecticut, be-

coming the first FBS team to lose to the Huskies since 2019. Saturday is Fresno State's first home game in more than a month.

Things have been much different in Silicon Valley.

SJSU is riding a three-game winning streak and rolling on both sides of the ball.

Quarterback Chevan Cordeiro has won back-to-back Mountain West Offensive Player of the Week honors, and SJSU's defense ranks ninth nationally in points allowed per game (14).

SJSU has outscored its opponents 107-29 in the past three games and hasn't allowed a point in the fourth

quarter during the stretch.

The Bulldogs lead the all-time series 43-38-3, in large part because of a decades-long dominance that saw Fresno State win 18 of 20 games from 1988 through 2010.

SJSU has turned the series back into a rivalry, and has won five of the past nine meetings. But the Spartans haven't won in Fresno since 2016.

Last season's loss was particularly frustrating because it prevented the Spartans from becoming bowl eligible in back-to-back seasons for the first time since 1985-86.

"That one hurt for sure.

Not only did we get beaten badly by our rival, but we lost our hopes of going to a bowl game," Hall said. "I think it left a bad taste in our mouth for sure."

Haener threw for four touchdowns and 343 yards for the Bulldogs in that game. SJSU's defense won't get another shot at trying to stop Haener, but can go a long way in continuing their rivals' miserable start to the season.

Since losing Haener, the Bulldogs' offense has spiraled, scoring 17 points per game after averaging 32.5 in the first two games of the season. The defense has allowed at least 35 in three of the past four games and has allowed the second-most rushing yards in the conference.

SJSU appears to have solved its early-season running issues. Through the first two games, the Spartans had rushed for a combined 103 yards (only Colorado State and Boston College were averaging fewer rushing yards per game among FBS teams). Since then, the Spartans rushed for 128 yards against Western Michigan, 142 against Wyoming, and then a season-high 203 rushing yards last week against UNLV.
