Developer presents plans for development

However, the plan does not include tenant parking

SANTA CRUZ » Architects from local building studio Workbench presented their pre-application plans for the construction of a mixed-use building at 1130 and 1132 Mission St. – the current site of the Food Bin and Herb Room.

The staff from the Santa Cruz based development firm presented the designs for the site alongside Santa Cruz Senior Planner Ryan Bane and project developers and owners of the long-lived local shops, Peggy Eulensen and Doug Wallace.

"A little over a year ago, Doug and Peggy, the owners of the Food Bin and Herb Room came to us with a request," said Jamileh Cannon, founding partner and principal architect at Workbench. "To thoughtfully develop their parcel and breathe some new life into the beloved stores."

At the meeting, Wallace and Eulensen, who took over ownership of the shops in 2018, stated

HIGHWAY 9 HOLIDAY SLIDE **Full closure** scheduled for next week

Highway could reopen to two-way traffic as soon as Wednesday

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BEN LOMOND » An overnight closure has been scheduled for early next week at the Holiday Slide along Highway 9 as crews work to reopen the winding roadway to two-way traffic after months of repairs, according to a release from Caltrans.

A full closure from lower Glen Arbor to Holiday Lane will be in effect beginning 9 p.m. Monday until 5:30 a.m. Tuesday. This gives workers time to remove concrete barriers and the temporary one-way signal system currently facilitating traffic, patch and repair the roadway and apply permanent striping.

Caltrans officials say the highway could fully reopen as soon as 5:30 a.m. Wednesday if final inspections confirm the soundness of the roadway and stability of the slope above it where the slide originated.

The section of highway was left impassible in early January

their main goals for the development. Wallace said that the primary goal and impetus for the monarch butterfly-themed redesign is to create an enduring home for the Food Bin and Herb Room.

"I get that question often from customers: Why are you doing this? Why are you taking away the stores?" said Wallace. "Really it's to find something that is more sustainable long term and a little more modern.'

"It's a store and it's a shop, but it's also a place where people hang out, get information, get educated," said Wallace. "It really is: How do we keep that going in a new space?'

Eclectic mix of entertainment coming to Boardwalk this summer

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SANTA CRUZ » For more than 116 years, the Santa Cruz Beach Boardwalk has provided a certain allure for residents and tourists alike, not only through its bounty of rides, amusement park attractions and close proximity to Main Beach but also through its plethora of other forms of entertainment: music, movies, magic and more.

All of that will be present this summer, when the Boardwalk hosts a variety of entertainment, all at no charge.

The first major entertainment attraction is the Live Music on the Colonnade series every Thursday night from June 15 to Aug. 10, featuring a mix of variety bands, tribute acts and even some local groups.

Boardwalk spokesman Kris through a rigorous process with the goal of finding quality performers

'We spend a lot of time researching bands, talking to people in the industry that know good live acts and filtering through, trying to figure out which would be good bands for our Boardwalk guests and who would be a good fit for what we're trying to achieve," he said.

In past years, the Boardwalk hosted a free summer concert series on Fridays, which drew bigname acts such as Blue Oyster Cult and Eddie Money. However, Reyes said the temporary closure of the park during the COVID-19 pandemic resulted in changes in how the Boardwalk presents its touches of funk. concerts.

"As we reemerged from COVID Reyes said bands are chosen and reopened, it allowed us an opportunity to reevaluate the totality of our entertainment offerings and look at things differently than we had in the past," he said.

Last year, the Boardwalk experimented with hosting smaller local bands on weeknights rather than Fridays, and Reyes said it resonated well with audiences.

'We found that our guests really enjoyed the experience, and it really aligned with our revised operating hours post-COVID," he said. "It was just a really perfect fit for us, so we really wanted to expand upon that this year."

Kicking things off June 15 is Sang Matiz, a seven-piece San Francisco band that fuses Afro-Latin beats, tropical elements and
