ELECTION INTERFERENCE CASE High court to decide on Trump's prosecution

WASHINGTON » The Supreme Court on Wednesday agreed to decide whether former President Donald Trump can be prosecuted on charges he interfered with the 2020 election and set a course for a quick resolution.

The justices' order maintains a hold on preparations for a trial focused on Trump's efforts to overturn his election loss. The court will hear arguments in late April, with a decision likely no later than the end of June.

The court said in an unsigned statement that it will consider "whether and if so to what extent does a former President enjoy presidential immunity from criminal prosecution for conduct alleged to involve official acts during his tenure in office.

The Supreme Court has previously held that presidents are immune from civil liability for official acts, and Trump's lawyers have for months argued that that protection should be extended to criminal prosecution as well.

Lower courts have so far rejected Trump's novel claim that former presidents enjoy absolute immunity for actions that fall within their official job duties. A panel of appellate judges in Washington ruled earlier in February that U.S. District Judge Tanya Chutkan, who would preside over the election interference trial, was right to say that the case could proceed and that Trump **TRUMP** » PAGE 2

McConnell said he plans to serve out his Senate term, which ends in January 2027, "albeit from a different seat in the chamber."

He spoke at times haltingly, his emotions evident, as he looked back on his career. Dozens of members of his staff lined up behind him on the back wall of the chamber, some wiping away tears, as family and friends looked down from the gallery above. Senators from both parties - most of them taken by surprise by the announcement – trickled into the chamber and exchanged hugs and handshakes.

President Joe Biden, who has had a productive working relationship with McConnell, said he was sorry to hear the news.

Live Oak School District board approves staff cuts

LIVE OAK » For the second time in less than a week, approximately 100 members of the public-mostly parents, teachers and some students – and at least 146 more on Zoom attended a Live Oak School District Board of Trustees meeting to object to proposed staff cuts meant to right size the district's perilous financial status.

After punting the decision amid a lengthy and chaotic meeting last week, the board unanimously approved preliminary layoff notices at a special meeting Tuesday for the equivalent of 53.29 full-time employees by next school year. That's about 24% of the 220.81 full-time equivalents authorized in the district, which oversees six elementary and middle schools.
